Sports Funding 2018-19

The sports funding is additional funding for publicly funded schools in England to improve the quality and breadth of PE and Sport provision. Schools are free to determine how best to use this funding to increase participation in PE and Sport so that all pupils can develop healthy lifestyles and reach the performance levels they are capable of.

For the academic year 2018-2019 William Gilpin Church of England VA Primary School will be allocated **£17,043**.

Additionally, by having the minibus we have been able to take children to sports events in larger numbers than we would have been able to with only staff and parent transport.	Since the last review the minibus has been out of school on 20 more occasions, (a couple of these trips will be for servicing) and 7 of these were sports related.	The school minibus has been used a total of 70 times this academic year, with 39 of these events for competitive sports. Other visits include outdoor activities and trips. The cost per trip (excluding petrol) is £75.77. The impact of the minibus has been that these trips could be facilitated. In the years prior to the minibus less children competed in competitive events. This was partly due to inability or unreliability in transportation. The impact has also been that



			etc. within physical education.			administrative staff do not have to spend time contacting and liaising with parents to arrange transports. Currently when taking a team, especially multiple teams, to an event we can often only secure one parent helper. If this was the case without the minibus it would mean only 6-8 children could attend an event reducing greatly our participation rate.
